An interview with Head teacher, Miss Hodgeon



Q. How long have you worked at this school?

A. 13 and a half years.

Q. How many schools have you worked in and what are their names?

Year 6 SAT's

SATS by Jack and Dylan.

What are SATS?

SATS (Standard Assessment Tests) help teachers learn more about children's strengths and weaknesses. Teachers can compare how well each child is doing with their peers, both in their school and across the country. SATs also help the DFE (Department For Education) and local authorities to see if schools and teachers are struggling or doing well. **The Government say it is compulsory that 10 and 11 year olds take all 5 tests (English reading, grammar, punctuation, spelling and maths) in England.**

Why do SATs seem so stressful?

Most children are stressed about SATs but in fact they are not a pass or fail, they highlight what the children have learned over KS1 and KS2. Here are the national figures from May 2016:

- 53% of pupils met the expected standard in reading, writing and maths,
- 66% met the expected standard in reading,
- 70% met the expected standard in maths,
- 72% met the expected standard in GPS,
- 74% met the expected standard in writing.

About Our School



The boy's school opened in 1885 and was run by Mr Noble. On the 6th January 1913 the seniors and juniors became one department.

The original Bovesfield School was built on Bovesfield Lane in 1881. It has changed a lot, as many head teachers have been in charge. Many years ago the genders were split.

The Infants opened on the 30th May 1881 and the head was Mrs C H Martindale.

The girl's school was led by Miss Margaret Wilson. About 204 girls attended the school.

In September 1976 the school opened on its current site of Northcote Street with Mr George Aitken as Head Teacher.



Hamaira has interviewed her mother, an ex pupil of Bovesfield Primary school, about her time at the school and how it has changed. Her mother attended the school from 1972-1979.

Q. What was school like then?

A. Good, although there were no after school clubs or halal food. The teachers could hit the children and the school wasn't rights respecting either.

Q. Did you go on any trips?

A. Yes, I went to Beamish and Saltburn but I never went on any overnight trips.

Q. How was it different to school now?

A. The children have more opportunities now and there is halal food available.

A. Mr. George Aitken

A. No

Q. What school activities did you do?

A. My favourite school activity was creative writing but we also had the usual subjects such as English, Maths and Science. We didn't have any SAT's (standard assessment tests) or any homework.

Q. Throughout school was there anything you didn't like?

A. No, I loved school.

Q. How would you describe how the school has changed?

A. The curriculum is stricter and we did more fun things then.

Q. What do you think of the school now?

A. It's very good. The head teacher is lovely and the teachers are teaching the children in a good way.
